

Hal Kurfehs: Steps toward prosperity for Western Connecticut

Alas, most of us do not have the background or the patience to study this document all the way through -- which is unfortunate since there are hundreds of stories within its pages that could benefit us to live a better and more productive life.

So how do we bring these pages alive and make them work for us? Simple -- it takes an organization to make it happen. Thanks to the CEDS we now know how to improve the economic climate in our region so the key becomes implementation of the plan.

At a bare minimum, a website has to be developed which will help our digitally aware residents to understand the options that are available to us. It will assist businesses in the region and attract new business from outside.

Other initiatives that can be taken are: a regional marketing program, business retention and expansion program, regional infrastructure Improvements, Future Skills Need Task Force, Sector and Cluster Advisory Councils, Regional Cultural Center and Regional Main Street Program.

These are proactive initiatives and the common denominator to make them happen is funding. WCEDA can do as much or as little as our funding will carry us. To compete with other regions, counties, and states we need an organization that is capable of reaching out with the proper tools to make Western Connecticut a better place to live and work.

In October, the regional planning agency for Western Connecticut will be merging with Southwestern Connecticut to make a Super Region. WCEDA is starting to lay the groundwork for regional funding supplemented by private business donation.
